



## Pupil Premium Report 2013-14

### What is the purpose of pupil premium funding?

“The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and their peers by ensuring funding reaches the pupils who need it most to tackle disadvantages.”

“It is for schools to decide how the Pupil Premium, allocated to schools per FSM pupil, is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility.”

### Context

- The % of pupils in the school who are receiving free school meals has increased to **21.1%**
- The % of pupils in the school who are looked after is **0%**
- The % of pupils in the school who have received free school meals in one or more of the previous 6 years (Ever 6) **28.6%** which is roughly the same as last year.
- The % of pupils in the school who are from service families **3%**

### How much pupil premium funding has the School received?

- In the financial year 2012/13 Withington Primary School received **£10,654** to support its pupils
- In the financial year 2013-14 Withington Primary School received **£17,400** to support its pupils

### Deployment

The pupil premium funding has been used to support a range of activities and interventions that are known to support pupil progress and attainment:

- The provision of additional educational resources
- 1:1 support for reading
- 1:1 and small group support for phonics
- Small group support for writing using Pie Corbett resources
- 1:1 support for numeracy using numicon
- Small group support for language and communication
- Small group support for children with EAL
- Small group support to improve behaviour

**What impact has the pupil premium funding had at Withington Primary School for those pupils with an entitlement to free school meals and for looked after children?**

- The percentage of pupils receiving pupil premium who have met their target in maths was **40%** for 2012-13 which was a 15% decrease from 2011-12
- The percentage of pupils receiving pupil premium who have met their target in reading was **55%** for 2012-13 which was an 11% increase from 2011-12
- The percentage of pupils receiving pupil premium who have met their target in writing was **70%** for 2012-13 which was a 48% increase from 2011-12
- In Key Stage two, the percentage of pupils receiving pupil premium who gained l4b+ was **100%** in reading, writing and maths in 2013. This was also **100%** in 2012.
- In Key stage one, the percentage of pupils receiving pupil premium who gained l2b+ was **100%** in reading, writing and maths in 2013. This was also **100%** in 2012
